

Environmental Assessment Program

Environmental stewardship is a key component in the successful management of a printing company regardless of size. Programs designed to minimize the generation of solid waste and mitigate air pollution will not only facilitate compliance with local, state and federal environmental laws and regulations, but also help create a positive work environment and communicate a company's proactive approach to reduce its' impact on the environment.

The GLGA Environmental Assessment Program has been designed to augment the GLGA Safety Assessment Program and can be implemented alone or in conjunction with a safety assessment.

During the site visit, the environmental assessor will tour the plant and review the company's environmental records:

- Air and water quality permits.
- Hazardous waste management and disposal records.
- Raw material usage data.
- Safety Data Sheets.
- Environmental policies.
- Programs and plans implemented at the plant
- Reports submitted to local, state or federal environmental agencies.
- Any other written correspondence to and from those agencies.



At the end of the site visit, the assessor will provide a verbal status report regarding the environmental issues of the facility. Within two weeks following the site tour the assessor will provide a brief written status report summarizing initial findings and recommendations.

The environmental assessment takes approximately 2 – 6 hours. The cost ranges from \$500 to \$1,000 depending on the size and complexity of the facility. Companies located outside of a 50-mile radius of the environmental consultant also will be required to pay travel reimbursement at the current federal mileage rate.
